

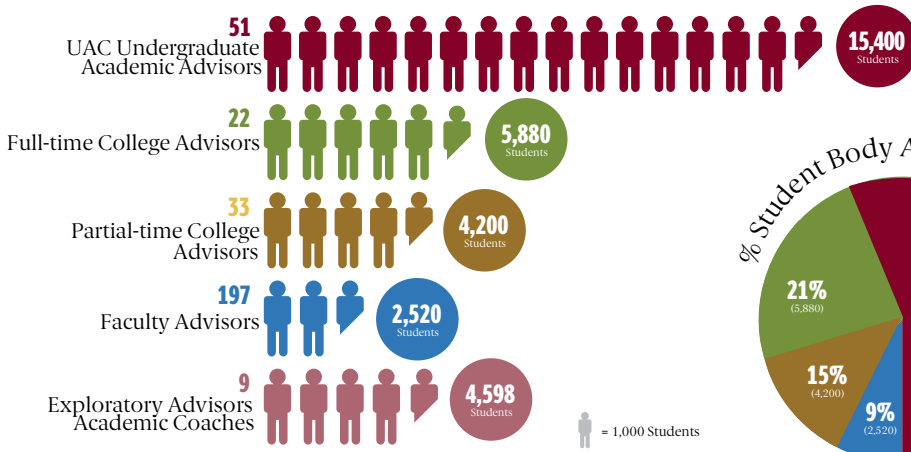
ADVISING ROLES: ACADEMIC, PROGRAM, AND RESOURCE

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Advising is a complex, multi-layered process involving multiple stakeholders on campus. To understand the progress of academic advising efforts, it is important to understand the distinction between academic advising and other forms of advising a student may receive.

ACADEMIC ADVISOR

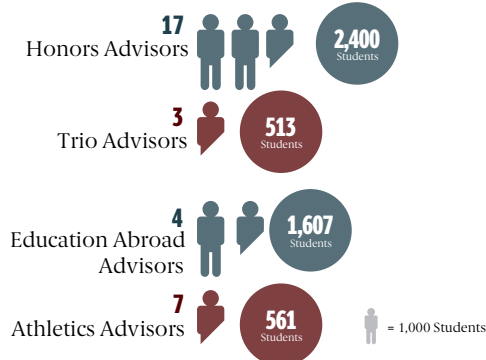
An advisor (UAC, College, or Faculty member) with students formally assigned on the basis of a student's major or program of study. Academic advising categories aim to identify positions on campus serving in a formal Academic Advisor role directly related to the student's chosen curriculum, major, and intended degree.



"Students served are an approximation."

PROGRAM ADVISOR

An advisor who works with students based on the student's formal participation in a program (not on the basis of a major or program of study). Examples may include Honors program, TRIO program, Education Abroad program, etc. Program Advisors may or may not have a link to the curriculum.



RESOURCE ADVISOR

An advisor who works with students to fulfill a specific/niche student need on an as needed or drop in basis. There are a variety of titles in this category; examples are listed below. Resource Advisors are not trained in curriculum.
