This Article surfaces the ongoing use of Facial Recognition Technology, which has been in active use by law enforcement since 2001. It shows how the technology has evaded judicial review

through “witness-washing,” a process which hides algorithmic technology behind the testimony of witnesses. Witness-washing allowed the technology to proliferate for decades without review of its accuracy, and without defendants and the public having knowledge of its use.
